Need: In 2000, Healthy People 2010 established the elimination of racial and ethnic health disparities as a national goal. The summit will look at healthcare disparities, including cardiovascular disease, infectious and respiratory diseases, diabetes, asthma/COPD, and renal disease in an attempt to provide integrated solutions that address these disparities. The goal of the program is to help to eliminate the disproportionate burden of premature death and preventable illness in minority populations (African Americans, Hispanics, American Indians, Alaska Natives, Asians, Native Hawaiians, and Pacific Islanders) through prevention, early detection, and disease management.

Educational Objectives: Upon completion of the program, physicians will better understand: health disparities in minority populations and cultural factors influencing symptom recognition and health-care-seeking behavior in minorities.

Target Audience: Physicians interested in factors influencing the health of minority populations and diseases that disproportionately impact minority communities.
